Bullying in Schools: How Successful can Interventions Be? Edited by Peter K. Smith, Debra Pepler, and Ken Rigby (2004). Cambridge University Press.

Compares the major interventions against school bullying that have been used in practice and by researchers since 1980 across Europe, North America, and Australia.

Bullying, Peer Harassment, and Victimization in the Schools. Edited by Maurice Elias, & Joseph Zins. (2002). The Haworth Press, Inc.

Presents empirical studies and reviews of the literature on bullying, peer harassment, and victimization. This book also identifies risk and protective factors, and provides practitioners with specific, evidence based guidelines for effective prevention efforts.

Bullying Prevention and Intervention: Realistic Strategies for Schools. By Susan M. Swearer, Dorothy L. Espelage, & Scott A. Napolitano (2009). NY: Routledge Press.

Gives girls, parents, and educators proven and innovative strategies for navigating social dynamics in person and online. Also provides step-by-step parental suggestions for dealing with traditional bullying.
